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An overarching issue that plagues me and my work, is time management. This has more or less accompanied my work ethic for as long as I can remember, at the very least from the middle of high school onwards. I'm not very good at planning out my time to complete assignments, so when I do get around to it, I either feel rushed to finish, and are mostly unsatisfied with my work. Another issue is proofreading. Most of the time when I'm able to complete assignments, I take the time to re-read at least twice, but again, when I'm rushed, I don't.

Seeing as how this was the first assignment of the course, the self-biography didn't feel high stakes. It was very enjoyable to write about myself in the third person. I think if there was a difficult part of this assignment it was finding what was the most important to say and trying to say it succinctly.

The documentary review was also a very fun assignment. I think I have, in the past at least, had a difficult time writing the most uniform of papers. Often, my thoughts are fleeting and/or wander, and that results in a sort of strange paper. Definitely proofreading and other revisions were needed and those are tools that I should work on using for the remainder of my academic career.

With my documentary review and my Op-Ed, and slightly with my profile interview, I didn't feel and I don't feel like I did the best that I could've; although circumstances surrounding the duration of the assignment let me too be on able to complete them in a timely fashion, I'm the first to admit I didn't organize a specific time to get caught up. In the future, I would like to

start creating a calendar of assignments and large projects, working on them in small increments over. Have a couple of days, to complete them in a more than satisfactory manner.

The profile interview was the one assignment I enjoyed writing the most.

Again, something that I'm usually good at but sometimes failed to follow through on, is the works cited page. This is the former issue or something that I'm usually good at, but often fall through on.

All components of writing can be improved, I often in my rough draft and second draft, create a lingering thesis statement, or maybe a thesis statement that doesn't really relate to the entire paper. In the future I should be more direct with my thinking, and find a singular idea to workshop.

Something that I think that I am good at is finding something interesting to talk about. Or finding an interesting point of you when writing a document to review, or an op-Ed piece. And when I do take the time to complete the work cited page, or proofread, my papers are really good. It's just a matter of making the time and using that time wisely, to make a project I'm actually proud of. I don't have the power of foresight, but I know that these are things that I have issues with, and will have to continuously work on through my academic and professional careers.
